The Schooling of Bento Bonchev The True Story of the Famous Bulgarian Student

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ABOUT THE PLAY...Somewhere in the not-too-distant future, a grad student named Bento runs out of patience at his typical American university. He no longer wants to study that ancient relic of human behavior called love. He no longer believes it even ever existed. It was just a myth someone dreamed up to market useless products. As Bento breaks with his mentor-professor, shuns the attentions of a young student named Sandy and feels his life falling apart, he sees the world engulfed in a furious sexual revolution and falls into happily married life - all as he strives to just connect.

MAKSYM KUROCHKIN (Playwright) is recognized as one of the most imaginative playwrights in Moscow today, "the ideal playwright for the global age," as Moscow Times critic John Freedman defined him. Kurochkin is the recipient of the Boldest Experiment of the Year award from the Moskovsky Komsomolets daily for Kitchen, the Moscow New Drama award for the futuristic comedy Titus the Irreproachable, and the Russian Anti-Booker award for experimenting with new avenues in drama. In Afisha magazine, Russian critic Yelena Kovalskaya named Kitchen one of the top 20 plays in Russia in the first decade of the century. The Moscow Times named his Repress and Excite the best play of the 2006-7 Moscow season. Translations of that play and Vodka, Fucking, and Television, his trailblazing work from 2003, appeared in TheatreForum magazine. A translation of The Schooling of Bento Bonchev was workshopped at Towson University in 2010 and published in Performing Arts Journal. Titus the Irreproachable, translated by Noah Birksted-Breen, was a featured reading at the Russian Theatre Festival in London in February 2010. John J. Hanlon's translation of Mooncrazed was presented at the HotINK festival at NYU in January 2010. In December 2010 Kurochkin and Hanlon attended a retreat hosted by the Lark Theatre in New York and began working together on a new play, provisionally titled Escape.

JOHN FREEDMAN (Translator, Dramaturg) has translated three dozen Russian plays which have been performed in the United States, Canada, England, Australia and South Africa, including five works by Maksym Kurochkin. His translation of Olga Mukhina's "Flying" was produced in 2011 at Breaking String Theater. He has published and/or edited nine books about Russian theater, and for two decades has been the theater critic of The Moscow Times. He was the Russia director of The New Russian Drama project at Towson University, 2007- 2010, and the director of the U.S.-government supported New American Plays for Russia program, 2010-2012. With the company and Jennifer Johnson he was co-author of the Double Edge Theatre performance "The Firebird" in 2010, and his play "Dancing, Not Dead" won the new play competition conducted by The Internationalists in 2011.

SERGIO ALVARADO (Sapiridis, Simon, Ensemble), originally from South Texas, received his M. F. A. at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. He has been seen and heard in San Antonio, Louisville, and New York City, but is happy to call Austin his new home. Recent credits include Present Company's, Much Ado About Nothingand The Winter's Tale, as well as Poison Apple Initiative's, Woyzeck. RONIS ALVARENGA (Ensemble) is excited to be a part of this amazing production. He has enjoyed working with both the cast and production team. She has also performed regionally in All's Well that Ends Well, Austin Scriptworks' The Out of Ink Festival, A Midsummer Night's Dream and FronteraFest's Baby in the Basement. After graduation, she has been seen in several short films, commercials, and is currently an understudy for Life Lines, a ongoing suicide prevention program at Fort Hood. GARRY PETERS (Frank) has been performing in theater, film, and animation productions for over ten years. His most recent stage appearance was as Kit Maxwell in Men of Tortuga. Previous theater credits include Of Mice and Men (Candy), A Soldier's Story (at the 2011 Round Top Festival), Cat on a Hot Tin Roof (2010 B. Iden Payne Award winner as Big Daddy), Shakespeare's Husbands and Wives (Julius Caesar), As You Like It (both Dukes), An Inspector Calls (Inspector Goole), American Misfit (George Washington et. al.), Molly Sweeney (Mr. Rice), and Hedda (Judge Brack and Aunt Julie). DEVYN RAY (Sandy) has studied in the Theatre program at St. Edward's University. She taught acting and stage managed for Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp and worked as a hair and make-up artist for The Utah Shakespeare Festival. Dawn received her MFA in acting from the University of Missouri (Kansas City), during which time she held a directing internship with Lookinnglass Theater Company. She has taught Shakespearean performance for the Great Lakes Theater Festival, and later served as the head of theater education for the Beck Center for the Arts. Since moving to Austin, she has worked with the Wimberley Players, Frontera Fest, The Encyclopedia Show and The Loaded Gun Theory. Her recurring gigs include work as the Moderatrix with the Dionysium, and freelance graphic designing and writing for CultureMap. Dawn practices yoga regularly, loves to sing to her guitar especially around a camp fire, loves a good hike, and is excited about working with Breaking String.

Ia loves her work and it shows. She has been nominated for quite a few B.Iden Payne Awards, and has been the lucky recipient of five of them...and is always on the hunt for the next project.

PAM FLETCHER FRIDAY (Costumes) has worked with dozens of companies over the years and she has been nominated for and received awards for excellent design from the B. Iden Payne Council, the Austin Critics' Table, and most recently was nominated for a Playshakespeare.com Falstaff award for her costume design for Austin Shakespeare's 2011 *Hamlet*. LAUREN HAYES (Assistant Stage Manager) is a stage manager in Austin's performing arts community. She graduated from St. Edward's University with a focus on stage management. She is excited to be working on her first production with Breaking String Theater.
