Josefina López (Playwright) Born in San Luis Potosi in 1969, Josefina was five years old when she and her family migrated to the United States and settled in the East Los Angeles neighborhood of Boyle Heights. Josefina is a graduate of Columbia College Chicago, has an MFA in Screenwriting from UCLA's School of Film & Television, and has a Diplome de Cuisine from Le Cordon Bleu, Paris. Josefina is the recipient

of numerous accolades, including a formal recognition from U.S. Senator Barbara Boxer's 7th Annual "Women Making History in Hollywood" in 1998; and a Screenwriting Fellowship from the California Arts Council in 2001. She and *Real Women Have Curves* (the screenplay) co-author George LaVoo won the Humanities Prize for Screenwriting in 2002, The Gabriel García Márquez Award in 2003, and the Artist-in-Residency grant from the NEA/TCG for 2007. Josefina is the Founding Artistic Director of CASA 0101 Theater in Boyle Heights, which is celebrating its 15th anniversary.



Claudia M. Chávez (Director) has been involved in the Spanish theatrical scene in Austin for over ten years as producer, director, and stage manager for local theater companies that foster the arts in the Latino community like Teatro Vivo, Proyecto Teatro, ALTA, and various independent productions. She recently directed Teatro Vivo's production of *Enfrascada*. Some of her other favorite work includes *Departamento*

de Soltera, Loterina, El Cielo Nuestro Que Va a Caer, Natividad: A Homemade Pastorela, Cuerdas, and Bajo Terapia. Magaly Olavarría (Stage Manager) received her Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts from Texas State University. She has served as Stage Manager and ASM for many theater and dance productions in the San Marcos and Austin area, including Adult by Association, Good People, Jesus Christ Superstar, and more recently Pastorela here at Teatro Vivo. She is thrilled to be working here for the second time in this wonderful production, and she feels very blessed to be part of the Teatro Vivo family.

Tomás Salas (Scenic Design) is a master scenic carpenter and lighting tech with 30 years plus working in professional theater, dance, and music shows. His experience includes serving as the technical director for Luis Valdez' El Teatro Campesino, and Master Electrician for the Mark Taper Forum and Japan America Theatre in Los Angeles. In Austin, Tomás is the Production Coordinator for the Austin Community College Drama Department and has worked as a freelance tech for just about every local theatre and dance company. Patrick Anthony (Lighting Design) is a freelance lighting and scenic designer and has worked in Austin since 2009, designing over 150 productions of theatre, musical theatre, and dance. Frequent collaborators are The Vortex Repertory Company, Austin Shakespeare, Capital T Theatre, Present Company, and Teatro Vivo. He has also designed internationally at the Dublin Fringe Festival. He holds a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre from Loyola University in New Orleans, and studied Scene Design at the Lir Academy of Trinity College Dublin. Patrick is the recipient of the 2012 θ 2016 B. Iden Payne award for Outstanding Lighting Design, as well as the 2016 θ 2017 Austin Critics' Table Award for Lighting Design. He teaches Stagecraft in the Department of Theatre at Southwestern University.

WET: A DACAmented Journey is the story of what it means to be an American in every sense of the word except for one: on paper. It chronicles the story of Anner Cividanis' journey of living his whole life in the United States as an undocumented American. The play captures the desperation that DREAMers feel when considering the very limited options of adjustment of status, by being forced to navigate through a broken U.S. Immigration System. This solo performance examines the mental,



emotional, and psychological hardship one man has to endure in order to secure his livelihood in the only home he has known: Los Angeles.
