

Director's Notes

Like so many others, I fell in love with C.S. Lewis as a child reading about Peter, Susan, Edmund, Lucy, Eustace, Jill, Digory, Polly, and all the rest. I drew maps of Narnia and pictures of Aslan, and I greatly resented that the 1988 BBC productions of the series ended after The Silver Chair. I eventually grew to know the rest of Lewis's works, including The Screwtape Letters and his sci-fi trilogy, but I confess I knew little of the man until I watched the 1993 Richard Attenborough film Shadowlands, starring Anthony Hopkins and Debra Winger. It secured my admiration for Hopkins as an actor and opened up a whole new appreciation for the story of Jack and Joy.

In preparation for this production I read several biographies, including one written by Douglas Gresham, and was continually amazed at these two wondrous people. I read passages about Joy visiting the Bronx zoo after hours as a girl and befriending the lions so she could feed them by hand, and I thought about Jack's image of two young girls riding on the back of Aslan to free their friend Mr. Tumnus. I read Joy's beautiful poetry against the horrors of war and thought about Jack and Warnie hunkered down in the muddy, blood-soaked trenches of WWI. I read about Jack dismissing suitors and suffering under the tyranny of Janie Moore for 30 years all for the sake of a naive promise, and I read about Joy suffering in a marriage to a man who was lost in a bottle of whiskey, who was openly unfaithful to Joy, and several times abused their children. Theirs was a remarkable journey of intellectual friendship and passionate love. It's a story I had to tell, and I was delighted to work with such an outstanding cast and crew to bring this tale to life.
