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ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Dame Agatha Christie DBE (September 15, 1890 – January 12, 1976) was an English crime writer of novels, short stories and plays. She also wrote romances under the name Mary Westmacott, but is remembered for her 80 detective novels and her successful West End theatre plays. Her works, particularly those featuring detectives Hercule Poirot and Miss Jane Marple, have given her the title the "Queen of Crime" and made her an important writer in the development of the genre.

Christie has been referred to by the Guinness Book of World Records as the best-selling writer of books of all time and the best-selling writer of any kind, along with William Shakespeare. Only the Bible is known to have outsold her collected sales of roughly four billion copies of novels. UNESCO states that she is currently the most translated individual author in the world with only the collective corporate works of Walt Disney Productions surpassing her. Christie's books have been translated into at least 103 languages.

Her stage play *The Mousetrap* holds the record for the longest initial run in the world: it opened at the Ambassadors Theatre in London on November 25, 1952 and as of 2010 is still running after more than 23,000 performances. In 1955, Christie was the first recipient of the Mystery Writers of America's highest honour, the Grand Master Award, and in the same year, Witness for the Prosecution was given an Edgar Award by the MWA, for Best Play. Most of her books and short stories have been filmed, some many times over.

Almost all of Agatha Christie's books are whodunits, focusing on the English middle and upper classes. Usually, the detective either stumbles across the murder or is called upon by an old acquaintance, who is somehow involved. Gradually, the detective interrogates each suspect, examines the scene of the crime and makes a note of each clue, so readers can analyze it and be allowed a fair chance of solving the mystery themselves. Then, about halfway through, or sometimes even during the final act, one of the suspects usually dies, often because they have inadvertently deduced the killer's identity and need silencing. In a few of her novels, including *Death Comes as the End* and *And Then There Were None*, there are multiple victims. Finally, the detective organizes a meeting of all the suspects and slowly denounces the guilty party, exposing several unrelated secrets along the way, sometimes over the course of thirty or so pages. The murders are often extremely ingenious, involving some convoluted piece of deception. Christie's stories are also known for their taut atmosphere and strong psychological suspense, developed from the deliberately slow pace of her prose.

Agatha Christie was revered as a master of suspense, plotting, and characterization by most of her contemporaries and, even today, her stories have received glowing reviews in most literary circles. Fellow crime writer Anthony Berkeley Cox was an admitted fan of her work, once saying that nobody can write an Agatha Christie novel but the authoress herself.

Spider's Web is the fifth play by Dame Agatha that Different Stages has produced. Previous titles are: *Black Coffee*, *The Unexpected Guest*, *Appointment with Death*, and *The Hollow*.

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CAST BIOGRAPHIES

SAM DAMON (**Elgin**, **the butler**) now in his third incarnation (as an actor) has appeared in one other Different Stages production as Arthur Birling in *An Inspector Calls*. He also played Huckabee in the Fantasticks (with John Carradine playing the Old Actor.) In between, Mr. Damon acted in various productions too numerous or obscure to delve into in Dallas, Ft. TREY DEASON (Constable Jones) holds a BFA in theatre from Southwestern University. This marks his third production with Different Stages, having appeared in *The Goat, or Who is Sylvia?* and *An Inspector Calls*. Recent acting credits include 69 Love Scenes (Gnap Theatre Company), The Secret Lives of the Inbetweeners (Vortex Rep, BIP Nomination-Best Supporting Actor), Romeo and Juliet (Sam Bass Theatre), Much Ado About Nothing (Austin Shakespeare), Little Murders (Loaded Gun Theory) and Ruddigore (G&S Society of Austin). He can be seen next in Hamlet at the Scottish Rite Theatre. Also a BIP nominated playwright, his one-act Cardigan will premiere at FronteraFest Long Fringe early next year.

Other Austin credits include *Beauty and the Beast*, *The Music Man* (Zilker Hillside), *Hay Fever* (NxNW, Payne nomination), *Peter and the Wolf*, *You're a Good Man*, *Charlie Brown* (Second Youth Theater, Payne nomination), *The Lonesome West* (Hyde Park Theater, Payne nomination), *How the Other Half Loves*, *The Boys Next Door*, *Songs for a New World*, *Death of a Salesman* (City Theater, Payne winner for Outstanding Featured Actor in a Drama). 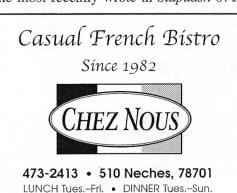

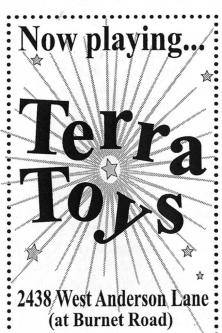
